Here are some answers to FAQs (August 1, 2008).

0 What About Mongoose Traveller?

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1. May I create my own, original works and put them on a web or ftp site or share them with my friends?

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You can write about the **Traveller** universe, and put it on your web site... but you can't reproduce the rules (or reproduce re-writes of the rules, etc.) except for about a page (because we give permission to do that, provided you post the proper acknowledgment). Some publishers just say "You can't post anything." We are trying to have a kinder, gentler approach.

We understand that you love the game and want to see it promoted. We believe in supporting you the best way we can. Right now, we encourage you to create your own original works and have them follow our policies, which are the fairest in the industry.

But you can't just go rewrite the books in your own words.
